He pointed out that characters in fantasy stories, particularly in *The Chronicles of Narnia*, undergo significant changes that mirror the transformative processes children experience. Zipes argued that these stories encourage children to imagine themselves in new roles and grapple with moral and existential questions.

Maria Nikolajeva extended these ideas in her research on the power of fantasy literature in shaping children's moral and social consciousness. In her analysis of *The Chronicles of Narnia*, she explored how the narrative framework encourages children to engage with complex themes like justice, leadership, and sacrifice. Martha Nussbaum, in her book *Cultivating Humanity*, explored how literature, including fantasy works like *The Chronicles of Narnia*, can cultivate empathy and moral responsibility in children.
